Fun Facts

Just as O'ahu is nicknamed "Hawai'i's Gathering Place," the reimagined [International Market Place](#) opening aims to attract kama'āina and visitors alike to the heart of Waikīkī. The region's newest attraction is expected to get people talking – not only about its premier shopping, dining and entertainment offerings, but also the rich legacy it's built upon and these fun facts about what it took to create it:

- International Market Place amasses approximately 345,000 square feet...
That's one square foot of space per person for Honolulu's entire daytime population
- The center stretches across six acres...
Slightly larger than Pahonu, the real-life oceanfront estate known as Robin's Nest on the Oahu-based TV series, "Magnum, P.I.," that aired from 1980-1988.
- A third-floor Grand Lānai for world-class and casual dining covers 58,000 square feet...
Four times the size of Shangri La at the base of Diamond Head
- The first Saks Fifth Avenue department store in Hawai'i is 80,000 square feet...
Six Olympic-sized swimming pools could fit in this space
- Construction generated approximately 1,000 jobs, and the mall will create more than 2,500 permanent jobs...
Making International Market Place one of the largest employers in Hawai'i
- About 700 parking spaces and valet service are housed in a multi-level parking garage...
Enough spaces to parallel-park a line of cars the entire length of Waikīkī Beach
- The center's foundation required 13.5 miles of micropiles...
Enough to build a bridge all the way from International Market Place to Kailua Beach, on the island's windward side
- 22,715 cubic yards of concrete were poured...
Enough to pave a 3-foot path around the entire 112-mile O'ahu coastline
- Construction required 1,375 tons of reinforcing steel...
About 100 times the weight of a cruise ship anchor
- ...and another 3,000 tons of structural steel...
That's 6 million pounds of Dole pineapples or about 75 adult humpback whales
- The center's 165 trees include three existing monkeypods and a massive, 160 year-old banyan tree...
Just as the banyan tree once held a treehouse where radio broadcasts were done in the 1960s, visitors can once again traverse its upper branches via pedestrian bridge and

visit the new treehouse on the second level

- No fewer than 3600 gallons of paint, stain and sealer were applied...
Enough to fill the Northwestern Hawaiian Islands marine life tank at Waikīkī Aquarium
- 10,500 square feet of moss rock landscapes the grounds...
Enough to nearly cover the front lawn of the Hawai'i State Art Museum
- About 121,000 square feet of stone and other tile covers the center's floor...
Enough to tile the entire turf field at Aloha Stadium
- The center's signature Lamakū Torch Tower just off Kalākaua Ave. is 79 feet tall...
That's nearly 10 surfboards stacked end to end, or four statues of King Kamehameha the Great in front of Ali'ōlani Hale, stacked atop each other

Developed by Taubman and CoastWood Capital Group in conjunction with Queen Emma Land Company, the 345,000-square-foot International Market Place will offer approximately 100 retailers and the state's first Saks Fifth Avenue. For ease of access, International Market Place will offer 700 parking spaces and valet parking. Grand opening will take place August 25, 2016.
